CHRISTMAS: During the Christmas season of 2024, a figurine of Jesus was stolen from a public display in downtown Fort Collins, Colorado. GENEROSITY: Jeannie Tarkenton's roommate was facing a financial crisis during their sophomore year at Princeton. MacKenzie would have to drop out during the 1989-1990 school year if she couldn't come up with \$1,000. With no other options, Tarkenton convinced her dad to loan her roommate the \$1,000. Today, that once cash-strapped sophomore is one of the most influential philanthropists in the world. The former wife of Amazon's Jeff Bezos, MacKenzie Scott, is worth about \$34 billion and she has donated more than \$19 billion dollars to various causes. Scott shames the more wealthy by actually giving away her money rather than just making public commitments to do so in the future, and she attributes that act of kindness nearly four decades ago as a catalyst for her philanthropy today. JESUS: During a Christmas pageant in the Bethel Union Church of Duarte, California, Audrey Mieir was overwhelmed by what she experienced. Christmas was on Sunday in 1955 and that small church presented the story of Christ's birth through their youth acting out the parts. It was a simple, powerful time of worship punctuated by the pastor declaring from Isaiah 9:6, "His name shall be called Wonderful." After Dr. Luther Mieir said those words, his sister-in-law's mind took flight. The flyleaf of her Bible became an artist's canvas and she wrote out words and music to a simple chorus: *His Name Is Wonderful*. She taught it to the youth group and it was sung publicly for the first time during their evening service. The song is not typically connected to Christmas but it was created and sung on Christmas Day 70 years ago this year and it's been sung around the world ever since in many languages. *Handbook To The Baptist Hymnal, Jere Adams, 1992, p.139*

MONEY: The National Retail Federation has predicted this will be the first time Americans spend \$1 trillion during the holiday season. Consumers anticipate spending \$890 per person on average. Dr. James Dobson founded *Focus on the Family* in 1977 and recently passed away on August 21, 2025 at the age of 89. In one of his classic books, he opened with a story about a family night of playing Monopoly. His competitive nature got the best of him and he trounced his wife and daughter like a wolf on Wall Street. They were not pleased with his behavior so they hurried off to bed, leaving him to put up the game. He had felt such power while they were circling the board, but now he felt empty and alone. His energy dissipated as he sorted the money and realized it all

PEACE: Militarization is sweeping the educational system for Russian students as the war against Ukraine continues. They must bone-up on Santa lore and be prepared for kids' tough questions. "Ho-ho-ho" requires refinement to a comforting soft laugh so as to sooth rather than frighten.
